#### WINTER AND SNOW PREPARATION

Well, summer and fall have come and gone. And now it is time for us to start preparing for the winter ahead. We all know, here in Nebraska, winters can get a little rough and very unpredictable. So we try to be prepared at all times to have the streets cleared and safe for the community to drive on.

In preparing for winter, there are a number of things we try to do to be sure things run smooth and as effective as possible, such as servicing all vehicles that will be used in moving and removing snow, applying snow wax in all dump trucks to allow for snow to slide out, and installing a good set of chains for the road grader to get through heavy covered areas.

For us and the community, it is best to start clearing snow early in the morning to avoid traffic and to allow many of the priority streets, Fire Hall pad, and Nursing Home to be cleared and ready for everyone. We do ask that you remove vehicles from the side of the roads to give us a chance to clear as much snow as possible. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated. Also, we ask that you please remove any low hanging trees that are above sidewalks and hanging over the street. THANK YOU!!

We have a set of Emergency Snow Routes and a few priority streets that we like to clear first. Here is the list of streets and places:

Nursing Home Fire Department Pad

Minor Avenue—Business District Kellogg Avenue
Kossuth Street—East Towards Highway 23 Kennett Street

Minor Avenue—South Medina Avenue—South

School Street

Please know that we try to clear all streets in a timely matter. Thank you for working with us! Everyone have a safe winter.

#### SIDEWALKS AND PARKED CARS

When cleaning your sidewalks and driveways, please do not put the snow in the street! You need to put it on your yard. When putting it in the street, you are making it harder for the Street Department to get things cleaned up. By piling snow in your curb line, you are creating drainage issues which can lead to icing and street damage.

If you do not want your vehicle buried in the snow by the snow removal crew, please move your vehicle as soon as possible so that the snow can be removed in front of your house without causing stress for anyone.

The Village does not clean sidewalks or driveways.

#### **Bertrand Fire & Rescue Department**



The Bertrand Volunteer Fire Department & Rescue Unit received their new ambulance on October 12th. The unit was built by Fire Fox in York, Nebraska and is mounted on a 2019 Ford chassis.

On October 15th, the Phelps County
Mutual Aid Association met at the Loomis
Fire Station for their quarterly meeting.
Naloxone protocol and EMS updates were
the topics covered during the training

portion of the meeting. Those in attendance from Bertrand were Brian Schroeder, Katie Benson, and Kevin Stehl.

It is our goal to supply each of our responders with reliable personal protective equipment. Our full face respirator project goal was met in October and 30 air purifying masks have been delivered to the department. P-100 cartridges will protect against organic vapors, chloride, hydrogen chloride, sulfur dioxide, hydrogen sulfide, hydrogen fluoride, chlorine dioxide, ammonia, methyl amine, and formaldehyde. The P-100 pre-filter adds protection against all particulates with 99.97 minimum efficiency and are oil proof. The masks will also offer eye protection. We received funds from the Nebraska Forest Service (VFA grant), several private donations, the Bertrand Area Community Fund, and the Bertrand Serving Committee. Thank you to those who have helped support this need.

The 2019 give2GROW campaign was held November 14th. Funds raised during this event will help fund a new stair chair and a pediatric restraint for the ambulance. We received an abundance of support and can't thank the community and surrounding area enough for their generous contributions.

Our department hosted a hazardous materials class on November 25 & 26th. The class was taught by Brian Busse of the Nebraska Fire Marshal Training Divisions. Attendees received 6 hours of continuing education credit.

Santa will be visiting the Bertrand Fire Station on December 7th from 2-4 PM. We will be providing fire truck rides and there will be treats. The Bertrand Lions Club will be sponsoring a Hallmark Christmas with events starting at 4 PM.

The officers and members of the department wish you a safe and joyous holiday season.

#### Bertrand Area Community Foundation Fund

Christmas is a time of giving. The Bertrand Area Community Fund announced the Holthus Challenge earlier in 2019. Pledges and gifts received to date have reached the two thirds (2/3) mark of \$200,000. Kelly and Virginia Holthus's love of Bertrand has inspired them to issue this incredible challenge to our community to build a fund for now and the future. A \$450,000 increase to Bertrand's unrestricted endowment will result in over \$20,000 of additional annual endowment payout in the first year alone. On November 14th, the Nebraska Community Foundation hosted its 25th annual celebration in York at the Holthus Convention Center. Part volunteer training, part hometown expo, part celebratory banquet was attended by Joel High, Chris Davison, Liz Ford, Bev Hansen, Karen Nelson, and Melissa Vinzant. Divide and conquer was how they tackled the day to attend the 15 training sessions. They were just a small part of the 360 community volunteers representing more than 100 Nebraska communities, and 640 guests for the evening meal.

Stephanie Dannehl, Librarian Tech Integration Specialist and Bill Ford, Industrial Technology, staff members of Bertrand Community School, along with Addison Hansen were presenters at the NCF Annual Celebration. They shared how Bertrand students use emerging technologies. The creation of 3D designs and interacting with them are encouraging the students to be better problem solvers and are preparing them for the future. Impactful grants from BACF and NCF helped with the purchase of new technology and software programs for the school. These three individuals were busy from 7:30 AM to 6:30 PM demonstrating and answering questions from other affiliated fund volunteers. Thank You—Bill, Stephanie, and Addison.
