Bertrand Fire & Rescue

After many years of service, two of our longtime members recently retired from the fire department: Larry Bennett, who served for 48 years, and Tom Wilcox, who served for 31 years.

We thank them both for their service to the community as firefighters and EMTs.

At the February meeting, we accepted Amanda Gardine and Colby Gardine as new members of the department. Thank you both for supporting your community!

As we closed the books on 2020, the tally shows we answered 21 fire calls and 67 ambulance calls. Some of the challenges we faced were being short on responders that were quarantined due to COVID-19. Many of our meetings were held via ZOOM and much of the training was done virtually online. The fire index rating was high during the second half of the year due to dry conditions and at one point in November, we answered 8 fire calls in 5 days!

The membership has started a new project. We are raising funds for a compressor so we will be able to fill our SCBA tanks (air packs) and the cascade system we have in place for them. It will be roughly a \$20,000-\$25,000 project. If you would like to support this, please contact Jessica Evans.

Young At Heart Senior Center

The last month has been quite an adventure! Starting in March of last year, we have had to visit the question repeatedly about whether or not it is a good choice to be open for dine-in lunches. In addition, we have had to cancel most of our monthly fundraising events. Some of you know that our fundraisers account for approx. 25% of our monthly income. So not being able to host those has had a toll on our income. In the 4 years that I've worked here at the Senior Center, I have been constantly impressed with the way the community of Bertrand comes together to support one another. The last year has been no different. Even when the traditional community activities cannot take place, people find ways to come together to support each other.

It finally looks like winter around here. On February 2nd, Punxsutawney Phil saw his shadow, so his prediction was 6 more weeks of winter. I think he and Mother Nature must have had a major miscommunication because we really hadn't had much "winter" before now. So, bundle up and do your best to stay warm.

As a reminder, ANYONE can eat lunch at the Senior Center. We are serving dine-in, curbside pickup, and take-out meals. For those 60 and over, the charge is \$4.00 and for those 60 and younger, the charge is \$5.00. We just ask that you call by 10 AM to let us know that you would like a meal for the day. Take-outs and curbside pickup meals will be ready by 11:45 AM and dine-in serving starts at 12 NOON. Spring Grant Application Information

Bertrand Area Community Fund (BACF) is accepting grant applications beginning March 1, 2021 and closes on March 31, 2021. Grants from our affiliated fund must be awarded to other 501(c)(3) charities, governmental entities (including schools), or for direct charitable expenditures in April 2021. These grants must meet the Internal Revenue Service rules and other legal requirements applicable to charitable organizations.

BACF will award meaningful grants to local projects that support improving the quality of life in the Bertrand area.

- ♦ Specialized playground equipment that allows children of all abilities to play together in the park
- ♦ Support for the Young at Heart Senior Center through a Matching Challenge Grant and new storage unit
- ♦ Various grants for equipment to the Bertrand Rural Fire District

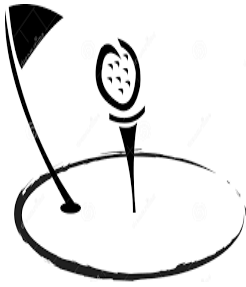

- ❧ If you have items that can fit in the dumpsters throughout the alleys, please do so. This will save space for larger items, such as couches, mattresses, etc. in the roll-off dumpsters.
- ❧ The Yard Waste Site is open 7 days a week. Use your key card to gain access.
- ❧ Please haul your own items to those locations if you are able. If you need assistance, please call the Village Office at 308-472-3455 for pick-up (limit to one pick up per household).
- ❧ Metal, appliances, and white goods can be taken to the Yard Waste Site.
- ❧ Tires, Paint and Batteries are NOT allowed in either the Alley Dumpsters or the Yard Waste Site.
- ❧ Please follow all the dumping instructions outlined in the policies and site map. Anyone violating these regulations will be fined up to \$250. Copies of policies and maps are available at the Village Office.

Yard Waste Rules and Regulations

- ◆ Only grass. Leaves, garden waste, branches, trees and white goods will be allowed at the site. **White Goods Include: refrigerators, stoves, washers, dryers, dishwashers, and hot water heaters.*
 - ◆ No more than three (3) vehicles will be allowed in the dumping area at the same time.
 - ◆ All items must be separated before dumping.
 - ◆ The pit is for trees, twigs, small branches, and untreated wood ONLY. If you are dumping coals in the pit, make sure they have been soaked and cooled before they enter the pit.
 - ◆ The grass pile is for grass, leaves, garden and yard waste. If these items are brought out in plastic bags, they will have to be dumped out and the bag or container taken back. **Absolutely no cans, plastic, paper, or other trash can be mixed with the grass, leaves, or garden/yard waste.**
 - ◆ Batteries, tires, and chemicals/paints are NOT allowed at the Site.
 - ◆ Wire, bedsprings, furniture, TVs, and small appliances are allowed in the large dumpster located at the Site.
 - ◆ Any shingles, siding, or other building materials that might contain asbestos must be bagged and taken to the Holdrege landfill site.
 - ◆ Card holders are prohibited from lending their card to anyone who is not a member of their immediate household. Business owners are prohibited from lending their card to anyone who is not employed by the business.
 - ◆ All loads from outside of the Village of Bertrand must obtain a permit and pay a deposit and dumping fee at the Village Office.
- Notice: Any abuse at the site can be tracked. Video cameras are installed at the site, and the Municipal Superintendent can view the violation as it is being committed. **The Municipal Superintendent is authorized to assess a fine of up to, but no more than \$250 per violation. A second violation and/or failure to pay a fine on or before it is due shall be subject to an immediate loss of privileges to access and use of the Yard Waste Site.**

Choice Gas Selection Period

The 2021 Nebraska Choice Gas program selection period has been expanded to run from March 18 through April 22, 2021. During this period, natural gas customers can choose their natural gas supplier and pricing option for the upcoming gas year, which begins June 1 and runs through May 31, 2022.

Formed by Nebraska communities to ensure competition in the program, ACE is the only community-owned supplier in the program. ACE also serves as an advocate for all natural gas customers. At the direction of the ACE Board, ACE returns money to its member communities. ACE has returned more than \$36,400—including \$4,316 for 2021—to Bertrand for community betterment use.

A Note from the Utilities Superintendent

Public health officials have always been concerned about cross connections and backflow in plumbing systems and in public drinking water supply distribution systems. People have utmost confidence in the water they drink. Open a faucet and we drink what comes out. If, however, the water is contaminated, sickness and even death can be the result. There are documented cases where cross connections have been responsible for contamination of drinking water. Many cross connections have resulted in the spread of disease; some cases have even resulted in death.

What is a cross connection?

A plumbing cross connection is defined as the actual or potential connection between a public water supply and a source of contamination or pollution.

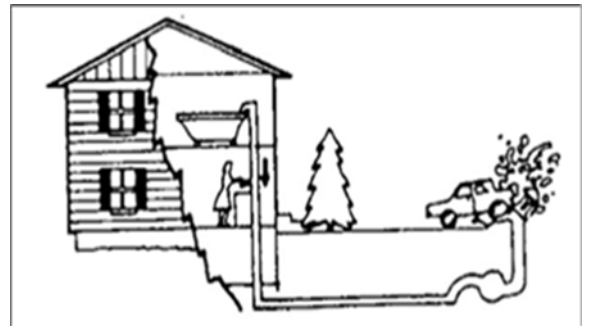
In other words, a cross connection is the link through which it is possible for a contaminating material to enter the drinking water supply system. Such links, or possible links, pose a serious public health hazard. Because of the hazards of cross connections, you and every other customer of the public water supply system have a responsibility to help safeguard your system and the public water supply system (city or rural water district) from cross connections.

How does contamination occur?

When a cross contamination exists, it is possible for a contaminant to enter the drinking water system when the pressure of the polluted source exceeds the pressure of the potable source. This may result in either a backsiphonage or backflow. Basically, either is a reversal in the normal direction of the water flow. Such situations can be produced through a variety of circumstances within plumbing systems, generally a drop in water pressure.

One example of backflow/backsiphonage:

- A. *Contact Point:* A submerged inlet in the second floor bathtub.
- B. *Cause of Reverse Flow:* An automobile breaks a nearby fire hydrant, causing negative pressure in the service line to the house, sucking dirty water out of the bathtub.
- C. *Suggested Correction:* The hot and cold water inlets to the bathtub should be above the rim of the tub.



D. How can you be affected?

“Stomach flu” (gastroenteritis) is perhaps the most common ailment suffered by those drinking contaminated water. The Center for Disease Control in Atlanta, Georgia, and the US Environmental Protection Agency have documented many cases directly attributing the following illnesses and others to contaminated drinking water: *Brucellosis, Campylobacter, Chemical Poisoning, Diarrhea Enteritis, Dysentery, Giardiasis, Hepatitis, Hookworm, Paratyphoid Fever, Typhoid, Polio.*

Sources of Contamination Which Require Attention at Home:

Any area with plumbing fixtures...

Kitchen: Sink, Dishwasher, Garbage Disposal

Bathroom: Toilet, Wash Basin, Bathtub Shower

Outdoors: Hose Bib, Faucet to Which a Hose May Be Attached, Buried Yard Hydrants

Sources of Contamination Which Require Attention at Work:

Industrial, commercial, and health facilities are subject to many types of cross connections...

Bottling Plants; Fire Systems; Heating and Cooling Systems; Mixing Tanks; Paint and Ink Mills; Planting Works; Mortuaries; Printing Plants; Vet Clinics; Hydraulically Operated Equipment

Sources of Contamination Which Require Attention at Leisure Areas:

Many recreational facilities have separate water systems and plumbing connections, which also may be improperly installed and maintained...

Campgrounds; County Fairgrounds; Parks and Playgrounds; Golf Courses; Swimming Pools; Fountains; Recreational Waterfront Areas; Travel Trailer Connections

Examples of Residential Contamination

Occasional water pressure disorders can occur in the public water supply distributions system or within your own residence. These disorders can be caused by high uses of water, such as occurs when fire or flush hydrants are opened, or when a line breaks, or when there are equipment failures. Because of reduced pressure, the flow of the water in the system may be reversed. As a result, contaminants may flow backwards or be sucked into your plumbing system through unprotected hoses or other possible cross connections.

Approved cross connection control devices are available which will prevent backflow or backsiphonage.

Some water customers may also have private wells. If an old well remains in operation, with valves to allow its use in the customer's water supply system, the potential exists for backpressure from that well water into the municipal or rural water distribution system. The private well must be completely and permanently disconnected from the public water supply system.

How to Prevent Entry Contamination

When the hazard of contamination exists, effective steps should be taken to correct the condition. *If the conditions cannot be corrected, then an appropriate backflow prevention device must be installed on the internal plumbing system.* This is generally the responsibility of the water user. Everyone should want to eliminate possible cross connections. Those who drink water on your premises will likely be the first to be injured if water becomes contaminated in your system.

An awareness of how contamination can enter a system is important. We must work together to keep everyone's water safe.

The people who are in charge of your water supply system are aware of the dangers of cross connections. Your public water supply system has adopted a policy on cross connection control to comply with Nebraska regulations.

One of the most effective and the most inexpensive controls is to always keep an air gap between any potential contaminant and the water system. Don't allow garden hoses or other hoses connected to the water system to drop into sources of contamination. Hydrants drain back even when shut off and contaminants can be siphoned into the hose or hydrant.

If you need further information or need assistance in determining what devices are appropriate, contact your public water system.

An all-terrain vehicle, scooter, UTV or golf cart may be operated on the streets and highways, within the corporate limits of the Village of Bertrand only if the operator complies with the rules of the road set by the State of Nebraska. Operator must be at least 16 years old and have a valid driver's license. Operators and passengers must be restrained in the vehicle or seated at all time. Parking on the sidewalks of the Village is NOT allowed. (Ordinance No. 674)

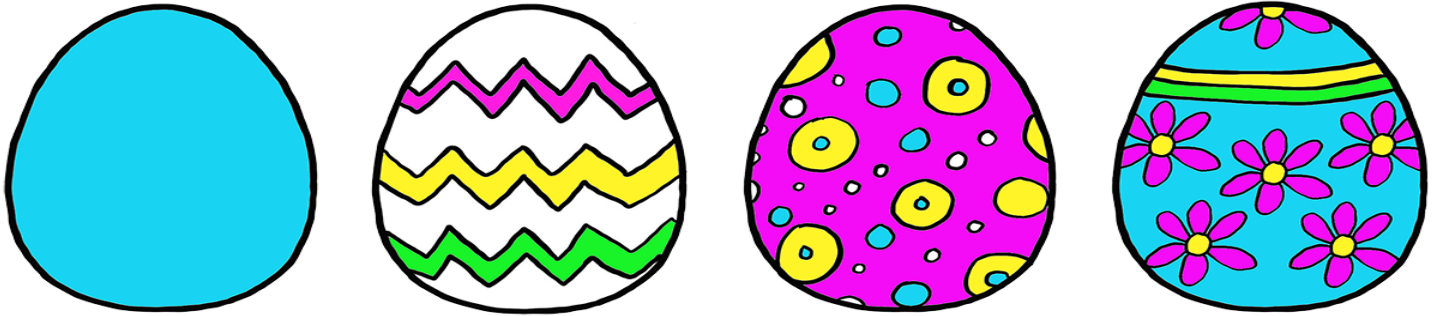
